Welcome to the Technology Lab

2nd Grade

Second Grade just completed an exciting app developed by MIT. Scratch Jr is an allows younger children to create their own



coding unit through the use of Scratch Jr, an introductory programing language that interactive stories and games.

As students code, they learn how to create and express themselves with technology, not just interact with it. In the process, children learn to solve problems and design projects, and they develop sequencing skills that are foundational for later academic success. They also use math and language in a meaningful and motivating context, supporting the development of early-childhood numeracy and literacy.

The goal was to create a story that recounts a short sequence of events, includes details to describe actions, thoughts, and feelings, and provides a sense of closure. This was an exciting unit because students were able to see how they can use technology to create something instead of just interacting with it. Students helped each other learn new tricks and techniques to help convey their story. They problem solved and learned to persevere through challenges.

Next up...

Keyboarding! Our students use computers every day, developing proper keyboarding skills is an important

fundamental skill our students need and educational activity to help early keyboard. Children are encouraged to match letters on the screen to their numbers and symbols are coming



to have. Keyboarding Zoois a fun elementary age students learn the use their index or pointer fingers to keyboards. Uppercase letters, soon.

3rd & 4th Grade

We've started an exciting new keyboarding program called *Typing Web*! This program has comprehensive instructional keyboarding activities that range from beginning to advanced skills. *Typing Web* has engaging lessons that include graphics and games with multiple opportunities for practice, individualized remediation

and goals for success. The lessons are designed to reinforce the skills of sitting up straight, keeping the hands curved and relaxed, and working from the "home" key positions.

I highly encourage additional keyboarding practice at home if you have a computer with internet access. I recommend no longer than 15 minutes per practice session. With this program I am able to access their accounts and see their progress as they go!

Next up...

Mrs. Smith and I will be working together with the 3rd grade on a colonial biographies project and the 4th grade on a US landmarks project. Stay tuned!

Helpful Hints and Tips

Have you checked out Common Sense Media yet? It is such a great resource. Here's their mission statement:

Common Sense is dedicated to helping kids thrive in a world of media and technology. We empower parents, teachers, and policymakers by providing unbiased information, trusted advice, and innovative tools to help them harness the power of media and technology as a positive force in all kids' lives.

New to Common Sense Media is a Parent's Concern section. This is where parents voice their concerns and experts weigh in. Some of the topics trending now are:

- How much screen time is OK for my kids?
- How can I get my kids to put down their phones?
- Are some types of screen time better than others?

What's most helpful about this new section is that you can explore questions by age. For example if you have a kindergartener and a 4th grader you likely have different concerns or questions about their media use. This is a great place to look for help and support.

Library Update

March has arrived! And with it comes the celebration of Dr. Seuss and his wonderful contributions to children's literature!



Across all grades we will be reading some of Dr. Seuss's lesser known works and discovering some interesting facts about the man known as Dr. Seuss.

PreK, Early K, and Kindergarten will be reading some of his beginning reader



books, including *The Tooth Book, The Shape of Me, Dr. Seuss's ABCs*, and *Ten Apples Up on Top*. They will explore some basic facts about Dr. Seuss and complete some fun literacy activities related to the stories.

1st and 2nd grade will be reading a variety of Dr. Seuss books including *Marvin K. Mooney Will You Please Go Now, Gerald McBoing Boing, On Beyond Zebra,* and *Did I Ever Tell You How Lucky You Are*? They will also be completing a "Dr. Seuss

Info Hunt" and other activities to learn more about Dr. Seuss.

3rd grade will spend the first two weeks exploring Dr. Seuss books and then move into the study of persuasive texts. We will read a few great examples of persuasive

books including *I Wanna Iguana* and *A Pig Parade is a Terrible Idea*. We will also begin exploring atlases at the end of the month.

4th grade will also spend the first two weeks exploring Dr. Seuss books. After that, we will look at dictionaries and figure out how we can use them efficiently and effectively. At the end of the month



we will begin a project about US Landmarks which will tie in with the United States unit going on in the classroom.
